# Parking & Towing Fines & Fees Reform

#### 1. Ordinance Amending RPP Policy

Allow low-income residents with outstanding parking tickets to purchase Residential Parking Permits.

## 2. Referral to the City Manager

Expand payment plan eligibility to 50% AMI.

Formalize practice of not towing for unpaid parking tickets.

Offer fee waivers for low-income, homeless, and first-time tows.

#### 3. FY 2024 Budget Referral for Additional Staff

Allocate \$383,512 for 2 FTEs to administer the expanded payment plan program.



#### **Current Situation**


### \$27,750

Maximum annual income for a family of 4 to qualify for the citation payment plan

#### **Typical Tow Charge**

- **+\$220** Tow Fee
- **+\$75** BPD Vehicle Release Fee
- +\$85/day Tow Storage Fee
- **=\$465** (With 2 days of storage)

Low-income resident is **unable to pay** off their parking tickets



Resident's RPP expires and they are **barred from renewing** 

Resident gets ticketed for parking without a permit, adding to the debt they owe



- **End cycles of debt:** The City of Berkeley should not be in the business of pushing people further into debt and poverty.
- **Encourage compliance:** Give low-income residents more options for paying off their parking tickets.
- **Reduce impact of punitive measures:** Towing is a massive financial burden, and thus should be reserved for situations where it is necessary for public safety. A fee waiver program should be implemented to alleviate costs.
